Yokokura Kazan (1915-1984) was born and worked in Yamagata Prefecture. Renowned for making iron tea kettles he first exhibited in Nitten (Japan Fine Art Exhibition) in 1951 and went on to receive a prize from the Hinster for International Trade and Industry at the Art of Tea and Flower Vessel Exhibition in 1958.
A regular exhibitor at Nitten, Kazan received the Tokusen and Hokuto Prize in 1959 and then the Grand

Prix at the World Exposition in Brussels in the same year. In 1960 he received the 6th Saito Mokichi Memorial Award.

Kazan also exhibited at the Japan Modern Arts and Crafts Exhibition from 1961-1965 and five of his pieces were selected by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs for exhibition in the US, Mexico, Australia and

New Zealand as well as at the International Art Festival in Berlin.

In 1966 he became a judge at Nitten and in 1972 received a Royal commission to make a tea kettle for the Crown Prince Akihito (b.1933) and Crown Princess Michiko (b.1934) of Japan.
